Yellow Dig Discussion Board — YellowDig Engage is a platform in CANVAS that will be used as a discussion board. Announcements will be posted and this platform is used to encourage learning and engagement. You will be required to interact on YellowDig weekly. Please post weekly to receive your allotted points.

Preparticipation and Facility Design Assignment – This assignment will help you evaluate the elements that go into designing and organizing an athletic health care program. You will apply your knowledge of the importance of Preparticipation exams and elements of an athletic health care facility. In parts I and II, you will apply your knowledge of the Preparticipation exam and describe its application. We will complete part I in class. You will submit your final assignment on CANVAS.

Article Appraisal - We will discuss this more in class. This assignment will help you appraise current literature regarding sport-related injury prevention. You will be required to find a peer-reviewed article about the randomly assigned sports-related injury and write a synopsis of the article (including answering questions located within the assignment, a summary of the findings, and how this may help you in your future). You will submit your final assignment on CANVAS.

Upper Extremity (UE) Assignment – For each given pathology, provide information of the relevant anatomy and how it is affected, include description of a mechanism of injury, explain an athlete/athletic population that is likely to have this pathology, and provide a summary of an article describing a plan of treatment (a rehabilitation process, return to play protocol, or description of surgical intervention, etc) for this pathology.

Quizzes - The quizzes will be multiple-choice questions. Quizzes will take place during class time, either at the beginning or end of class. If a student is not in class for the quiz, they will not be allowed to take the quiz. Lockdown browser will be utilized during the quizzes.

Written Exams – There will be three exams, but no comprehensive final. Each exam will possibly include multiple choice, true/false, fill-in-the-blank, short answer, and/or some short essay question types. You will have one class period to complete the exams.
