COURSE DESCRIPTION

Designed to enhance the independent clinical practice of athletic training practitioners. Content focuses on creating effective, comprehensive policy and procedures (e.g., emergency management, pre-participation evaluation and clearance) for appropriate clinical management of traumatic and environmental conditions within the standard of care. Appropriate documentation, practice standards and communication skills discussed and practiced. *Pre-requisite: Admission into the Doctor of Athletic Training program.*

LEARNING OUTCOMES

- 1. Develop, implement and critically-appraise policies and procedures that govern the ethical and professional practice of athletic training, including emergency action plans, preparticipation examination, exertional heat illness, concussion, lightning safety, etc.
- 2. Discuss, integrate and apply the legal standard of care expected in the professional practice of athletic training.
- 3. Apply proper evidence-based evaluation procedures in the diagnosis of common emergency illnesses and injury (e.g., environmental, concussion) sustained by the physically active population.
- 4. Discuss, integrate and apply standard techniques of spine motion restriction.
- 5. Discuss concepts related to teamwork knowledge, skills and attitudes and the interrelationship of these tools for the improved practice of athletic training.

COURSE REQUIREMENTS AND POLICIES

Teaching Strategies: Course material will be presented through in-person or video lectures, online materials and interactive workshop formats. This course will consist primarily of class roundtable discussions and some didactic presentations. Canvas e-learning platform will provide students with content to supplement discussions, details regarding assignment expectations and grading criteria/rubrics and serve to assist the student with applicable resources for programmatic success within the Doctor of Athletic Training Program.

Examination: The final examination will range in points from 75 – 150 and include a variety of question formats (e.g., multiple choice, select all that apply, matching and rank order). There will be NO make-up examinations unless exceptional conditions occur (as defined in the University of Florida Catalog). http://www.registrar.ufl.edu/catalog/policies/regulationattendance.html Prior permission from the professor is required. There will be a time limit for each examination. Examinations will evaluate the understanding of material from lecture, text, and other supplemental material provided. Examinations may be administered via e-learning using lockdown browser or additional proctoring method. It may take 5-10 minutes to download so please complete the process prior to accessing an examination. For MAC users, Safari is not a compatible internet browser with Canvas - please use either Internet Explorer, Google Chrome or Firefox (version 10 or 12 - not version 11) when accessing the e-learning system. If you have issues during an examination, please call the help desk 352-392-4357. Students should complete examinations during Help Desk hours so you will have access to assistance if needed. If you have an issue during a quiz/examination, please email the instructor once you have submitted the examination. Access to examinations after submission is restricted, but you will see the grade and it will be posted in the course gradebook.

Quizzes: Quizzes (6) will assess learning progress from lecture material and assigned readings. There will be a time limit for each quiz. To ensure that students are reading the assigned material, the quizzes may be both announced and unannounced. Quizzes will range from 1-25 points and include a variety of question formats (e.g., multiple choice, select all that apply, matching and rank order). For quizzes administered in e-Learning students may use notes only upon request of the instructor. The quiz will assess your retention of reading assignments. Students should employ examination best practices (stated above) for e-Learning quizzes. There will be NO make-ups for missed quizzes (showing up late, etc.), unless exceptional conditions occur as defined in the
