III. ABOUT THE COURSE

- Spell and define medical equipment, treatment, disease, and diagnostic compound terms.
- <u>Identify visually & describe verbally</u>, medical problems, disorders, conditions, and diseases.
- Express increased comfort when taking Prof. Admin. Exams (eg, GRE, MCAT, DAT, NCLEX, OAT, PCAT, GMAT, LSAT).
- <u>Interpret and understand</u> medical course content, literature, records, and research.
- Interpret and understand word (term) meanings from a wide variety of academic disciplines.

VI. HONORLOCK EXAM INSTRUCTIONS

Your exams for this course are proctored by the online proctoring service, Honorlock. You **DO NOT** need to create an account, download software or schedule an appointment in advance. Honorlock is available 24/7/365. Honorlock records your exam session by webcam as well as recording your screen. Honorlock also has an integrity algorithm that can detect search-engine use, so do not attempt to search for answers, even if it's on a secondary device. Any and all suspicions of cheating will be flagged and reviewed.

Before you take your exam, you should know:

- You will need your computer, a working webcam, and a stable internet connection.
- You will need Google Chrome and the Honorlock Chrome Extension. You can download the extension at www.honorlock.com/extension/install.
- You must take your exams in a place where other people are <u>not</u> in the room during the exam.
- You will need a valid picture ID (UFID, government ID card, driver's license, or passport).
