COURSE DESCRIPTION:

This course introduces students to research methodology and application of sport business and social science research. Areas covered include the study of the research process, research designs, proposal writing, sampling procedures, measurement, survey research, data exploration, and the research presentation.

COURSE OBJECTIVES:

By the end of this course, students will be able to:

1. Articulate the research process or the ways in which researchers go about their work, and the ways in which scientific inquiry proceeds.
2. Describe and demonstrate skills and knowledge to discriminate "good" from "bad" research reported in academic, business, and trade journals.
3. Gain an enlightened understanding the available research in the sports business
4. Demonstrate and articulate skills to locate problem areas in organizations, and plan, organize, design, and conduct research to help solve the identified problems.
5. Demonstrate the ability to write and present research proposals and reports for managerial decision making in sports organizations.

COURSE FORMAT:

Students are also expected to view all of the course lectures and complete all assignments as assigned in the syllabus and posted on the Canvas course website.

GENERAL EVALUATION GUIDELINES:

Grades will conform to the degree to which each of the requirements stressed in class is met in the various assignments and projects.

RESEARCH PROPOSAL

The major project of the semester is a research proposal conducted on a sport management problem within a client organization. Students should allocate adequate time to get the project done on time. Students will produce a research proposal prospectus for approval prior to beginning their projects and submit their final assignments as an oral report (using Voice Thread) at the end of the semester.

QUIZZES

A maximum of 1 hour will be devoted to each quiz. Quizzes are closed note and proctored through Honorlock. Each quiz is worth 75 points and will consist of multiple choice and true /false questions.

ASSIGNMENTS

Students will be responsible for several assignments as outlined in the grading scale and course outline. Specific instructions for completing each assignment will be posted on Canvas course website under the Module and Assignment pages.

Graduate Final Exam Requirement

During this course, the successful completion of the Review of Literature assignment will fulfill a requirement of the Graduate Final Exam, which is a requirement to be completed prior to the completion of the M.S in Sport Management degree at the University of Florida. To successfully complete the Review of Literature, the student must earn a minimum of 80% on the assignment. A failure to meet the minimum of 80% will require the student to rewrite and resubmit the paper to the instructor by the stated deadline, which will be before the end of the semester. However, the rewrite grade will not count towards the course but will count towards the successful completion of that Graduate Final Exam portion. A failure to successfully rewrite and resubmit the Review of Literature paper will result in earning an “Incomplete” (I) grade for the course until the requirement has been met. (Please note: An “Incomplete” (I) grade becomes punitive to your overall GPA approximately one semester following the assigned “Incomplete” grade.) It is the student’s responsibility to arrange with the instructor and agree in writing the timeline for successfully completing the Review of Literature in fulfillment of the Graduate Final Exam portion. If the student successfully earns a minimum of 80% on the first submission of the paper, then no further action is necessary
