Course Description: This course explores societal implication of sport in history and heritage, youth programs collegiate, and professional situations, and the involvement of minority groups, women, business, and industry.

Course Purpose: Social Issues in Sport is designed to acquaint students with the principles and applications of social issues within the sport industry. The course is grounded in sociological research and requires critical thinking to investigate the links between many of the major issues facing sport organizations today. Specifically, we will assess the intersection of race and sports, gender and sports, class and sports, media and sports, as well as the issues plaguing youth, college, and professional sports in American society.

Course Objectives: By the end of this course, students will be able to:

- Think critically and articulate how sports impact society as well as how society impacts sports.
- Articulate and explain the major sociological issues associated with gender, social class, race, and media, in sports.
- Describe the business of youth, college, and professional sports from a sociological perspective.
- Describe how competition and the professional commercial model of sport have an impact on the youth and college sport system.
- Gain an enlightened understanding of the relationship between society and sports.
- Provide clear solutions that sport leaders can use to improve many issues challenging sports in contemporary society.

Required Textbook: Woods, R. and Butler, N. (2021). Social Issues in Sport. (4th Edition). Champaign, Illinois, Human Kinetics.

Instructional Methods: The instructional methods for this course consist of lectures, readings, discussions, and videos to provide students with a variety of learning methods.

Materials/Supply Fees: There are no material or supply fees for this course.

Pre-Discussion Group Assignments (5 x 15 points):

- In lieu of class on Fridays, students with meet their Pre-Discussion Groups.
- The purpose of pre-discussion groups are to assist students in understanding course material outside of the classroom through interactions with students.
- In pre-assigned groups, students are to write five, one page papers using bulleted using bulleted points to convey your responses to various prompts.
- Each student individually submits five pre-discussion group assignments to Canvas with all group member names.

Individual Reaction Papers (6 x 30 pts = 180 points):

- Reaction papers are designed to assist students in expanding their knowledge and understanding of social issues and sport.
- Individual students are to write six, one-page reaction papers of content discussed during class using out of class time on Fridays.
- Assignment due dates are posted in the course schedule and must be submitted to canvas prior to the assigned due dates.
- All assignments must be typed and follow APA guidelines. Refer to the policy section of the syllabus.

Honorlock Quizzes I and II (2 x 100 pts = 200 points):

- Two quizzes are administered based on the lectures, discussions, readings, videos, and supplemental materials.
- Exams are multiple choice, true/false, fill in the blank, and/or short answer questions.

 - 1. Discuss the situation privately with me. I am always open to listening to students' experiences and want to work with students to find acceptable ways to process and address the issue.
 - 2. Discuss the situation with the class. Chances are there is at least one other student in the class who had a similar response to the material. Discussion enhances the ability for all class participants to have a fuller understanding of context and impact of course material and class discussions.
 - 3. Notify me of the issue through another source such as your academic advisor, a trusted faculty member, or a peer. If for any reason you do not feel comfortable discussing the issue directly with me, I encourage you to seek out another, more comfortable avenue to address the issue.
