Welcome to SPM3204: Ethical Issues in Sport. In this course, you will explore ethical issues and sports and prepare for the challenges you will face in your personal and professional career. We will discuss current events, describe the components of an argument, and recognize a problem and how to analyze it. You will learn to make decisions regarding moral and ethical issues and defend your position.

### Course Information

This course will utilize weekly lectures to explore ethical issues in sports and prepare students for the challenges they will face in their personal and professional careers. We will discuss current events (some may be controversial), describe the components of an argument and recognize a problem and how to analyze it. Students will learn to make decisions regarding moral and ethical issues and defend their position.

## **O Course Objectives**

By the end of this course, you will be able to:

- 1. Analyze and differentiate the importance of morals and ethics in athletics.
- 2. Analyze the pros and cons of current ethical issues in the sports industry.
- 3. Investigate and analyze various opinions on ethical issues in sport and their impact on sport today.
- 4. Research ethical issues currently spotlighted in the news and social media and how social media's impact has highlighted these ethical issues.
- 5. Examine the consequences of unethical and ethical business decisions.
- 6. Engage in discussions with classmates <u>WEEKLY</u> via Yellowdig. <u>(Note: it is your responsibility to set reminders as needed for YD points</u> <u>as this assignment shows up only once for points within Canvas.)</u>

## Course Components

#### Yellowdig Discussions

In lieu of a traditional discussion board, we will utilize Yellowdig. We are using Yellowdig for two purposes: as a way to create a community outside of our classroom (since we are never together in person) and as a forum for having discussions about course content and reflecting on your thoughts and understanding of ethics within sport. To do this, you must post items of interest relating to sport ethics (articles, videos, websites, etc) on Yellowdig each week. You can also post and comment with your own personal experiences.

Yellowdig will help you learn and prepare for other parts of the class, so your Yellowdig participation will be counted as part of your grade. To earn full credit for that part of the class grade, you can earn up to 100 points for the semester by adding Pins and commenting on and earning likes from your peers.

#### <u>\*\*\*NOTE: this is an assignment that updates weekly; you can earn up to 10 points per week with a max of 100 points for the semester. If</u> you do not post one week, you will not be able to make these points up later.

#### Assignments

There will be several assignments during the semester, including the final project. Each assignment is designed to foster analysis of the course content up to that point and apply ethical considerations to relevant aspects of the sport industry. Several assignments require more time commitments than others, so I recommend looking them over several weeks in advance to properly schedule the time needed for their successful completion.

#### Quizzes

Students will be required to take a quiz to help ensure understanding and comprehension of the material from the lecture(s). Quizzes will consist of five to ten (5-10) questions, and students will have 10 - 20 minutes to complete them. Quizzes will be available via Canvas for 2 days only during the days on which they are offered. Students will have one opportunity to complete each quiz; all quizzes are open notes. We are not responsible for computer or connection errors, so students must ensure the computer is reliable and has a secure connection. I recommend taking quizzes earlier in the day to leave time to work through any potential issues. Should there be computer issues, please contact Learning Support Services and email me immediately detailing the issue. Be sure to include the LSS Request #.

#### Exams

There will be three (3) exams during the semester. Each exam will follow its module and will focus only on that material. Each exam will have 40 questions, and students will have 1 ½ hours to complete them.

You must be a sophomore standing or higher to take this course.

#### **Minimum Technology Requirements**

## Course Policies

When communicating online:

- Treat the instructor with respect, even via email or in any other online communication.
- Always use your professors' proper title: Dr. or Prof., or if you are unsure use Mr. or Ms.
- Unless specifically invited, don't refer to a professor by their first name.
- Use clear and concise language.
- Remember that all college-level communication should have correct spelling and grammar.
- Avoid slang terms such as "wassup?" and texting abbreviations such as "u" instead of "you."
- Use standard fonts such as Times New Roman and use a size 12 or 14 point font.
- Avoid using the caps lock feature AS IT CAN BE INTERPRETED AS YELLING.

- Limit and possibly avoid the use of emoticons like :).
- Be cautious when using humor or sarcasm as tone is sometimes lost in an email or discussion post and your message might be taken seriously or be construed as being offensive.
- Be careful with personal information (both yours and others).
- Do not send confidential information via email.

When you send an email to your instructor, teaching assistant, or classmates:

- Use a descriptive subject line.
- Be brief.
- Avoid attachments unless you are sure your recipients can open them.
- Avoid HTML in favor of plain text.
- Sign your message with your name and return email address.
- Think before you send the email to more than one person. Does everyone really need to see your message?
- Be sure you REALLY want everyone to receive your response when you click, "Reply All."
- Be sure that the message author intended for the information to be passed along before you click the "Forward" button.

When posting on the discussion board in your online class:

- Check to see if anyone already asked your question and received a reply before posting to the discussion board.
- Remember your manners and say please and thank you when asking something of your classmates or instructor.
- Be open-minded.
- If you ask a question and many people respond, summarize all posts for the benefit of the class.
- When posting:
  - Make posts that are on-topic and within the scope of the course material.
  - Be sure to read all messages in a thread before replying.
  - Be as brief as possible while still making a thorough comment.
  - Don't repeat someone else's post without adding something of your own to it.
  - Take your posts seriously. Review and edit your posts before sending.
  - Avoid short, generic replies such as, "I agree." You should include why you agree or add to the previous point.
  - If you refer to something that was said in an earlier post, quote a few key lines so readers do not have to go back and figure out which post you are referring to.
  - Always give proper credit when referencing or quoting another source.

- If you reply to a classmate's question make sure your answer is correct, don't guess.
- Always be respectful of others' opinions even when they differ from your own.
- When you disagree with someone, you should express your differing opinion in a respectful, non-critical way.
- Do not make personal or insulting remarks.
- Do not write anything sarcastic or angry, it always backfires.
- Do not type in ALL CAPS, if you do IT WILL LOOK LIKE YOU ARE YELLING.

When attending a Zoom class or meeting:

- Do not share your Zoom classroom link or password with others.
- Even though you may be alone at home, your professor and classmates can see you! While attending class in your pajamas is tempting, remember that wearing clothing is not optional. Dress appropriately.
- Your professor and classmates can also see what is behind you, so be aware of your surroundings.
- Make sure the background is not distracting or something you would not want your classmates to see.
  - When in doubt use a virtual background. If you choose to use one, you should test the background out first to make sure your device can support it.
  - Your background can express your personality, but be sure to avoid using backgrounds that may contain offensive images and language.
- Mute is your friend, especially when you are in a location that can be noisy. Don't leave your microphone open if you don't have to.
- If you want to speak, you can raise your hand (click the "raise hand" button at the center bottom of your screen) and wait to be called upon.
