COURSE DESCRIPTION

Designed to enhance the independent clinical practice of athletic training practitioners. Content focuses on creating effective, comprehensive policy and procedures (e.g., emergency management, pre-participation evaluation and clearance) for appropriate clinical management of traumatic and environmental conditions within the standard of care. Appropriate documentation, practice standards, and communication skills discussed and practiced.

PREREQUISITE KNOWLEDGE & SKILLS

Admission into the Doctor of Athletic Training program.

REQUIRED & RECOMMENDED MATERIALS

Recommended: The Seven Habits of Highly Effective People by Stephen Covey, ISBN, 0671663984/0743269519. All other reading materials will be available on the class e-learning page, or the instructor will provide hard copies. Journal articles will be used frequently, some will need to be retrieved by students from various libraries on campus.

COURSE FORMAT

Course material will be presented through in-person or video lectures, online materials, and interactive workshop formats. This course will consist primarily of class roundtable discussions and some didactic presentations. Canvas e-learning platform will provide students with content to supplement discussions, details regarding assignment expectations and grading criteria/rubrics and serve to assist the student with applicable resources for programmatic success within the Doctor of Athletic Training program.

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COURSE LEARNING OBJECTIVES

- 1. Develop, implement, and critically-appraise policies and procedures that govern the ethical and professional practice of athletic training, including emergency action plans, pre-participation examination, exertional heat illness, concussion, lightning safety, etc.
- 2. Discuss, integrate, and apply the legal standard of care expected in the professional practice of athletic training.
- 3. Apply proper evidence-based evaluation procedures in the diagnosis of common emergency illnesses and injury (e.g., environmental, concussion) sustained by the physically active population.
- 4. Discuss, integrate, and apply standard techniques of spine motion restriction.
- 5. Discuss concepts related to teamwork knowledge, skills, and attitudes and the interrelationship of these tools for the improved practice of athletic training.

Course & University Policies

ATTENDANCE & PARTICIPATION POLICY

Attendance is mandatory. Students must provide a written notification of an absence (i.e., email) at least 24 hours prior to class; excused absences will be evaluated based on university policy.
